Marissa Collen explains her thought process, design decisions, and all that she learned during her fall semester in GDP 111, taught by Victoria Torf.



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This chapter assignment was based on learning how to work successfully on my computer and in InDesign. Learning good computer skills is the foundation to becoming a successful designer, so this chapter was important to me. I was taught the basic tips in working with InDesign and then created my first project: the snowman/robot. I was instructed to recreate a specific snowman-robot looking design, along with other elements, to help master my newly learned skills. Because I was a beginner with this program, creating my design was actually not as easy as it looked.

I began my process by placing the rectangular and circular boxes to create my snowman and robot. I had to carefully place them in the correct spots to look like they were stacked so I made the mistake of using the rectangle and ellipse *frame tool* when creating my robot instead of the rectangle and ellipse tool. I realized my problem when I looked at the example and it didn't have the "X" marks in the boxes. I then knew I used the wrong tool and had to my first ever project in InDesign! re-do my robot.

I next had a chance to experiment with the line tool to create my tick-tack-toe design in the lower left-hand corner. I had to make sure that each line was the same length and were slanted at the same degree. I didn't know how to use the shift button to set the slants back then, so I carefully drew each little line the same way. This was much more time consuming then it had to be, but I was a beginner and did it the hard way because I didn't know how to work with the tools very well yet. You can see, even in my final design that my lines were not perfectly the same length or aligned exactly the same way. These are design details that I have learned to fix throughout the semester.

Finally, the last step to my project was on each other. I was not used to the tools yet, to add type with a stroke and fill. I found that this was fairly easy to figure out and so it was not too hard for me to do. I typed the black text and added the red stroke. I did a quick comparison of mine to the example provided and I thought it looked pretty good. I was done with

#### Manipulating Graphics

The blank square, shown right, has only a stroke of black. The square to its right was then filled with red. All the shapes in the design were filled with a specific color.

The wavy line between the square and circle, shown right, was arranged to be placed in front of and then behind the shapes, just like in the design.

## **Raffle Ticket**

In chapter 7, I learned how to work wording, then added the lines using the "tab" button in order to make them equal in length. After completing that section, I had to rotate the text box 90 degrees counter-clock-wise so that it would follow the correct ticket design.

Once I had my raffle ticket layout finished, I selected all the components, and went to "Edit + Step and Repeat" so that I could multiply my design to create the six tickets. I repeated my raffle ticket the correct number of times so that I had all six aligned perfectly on my page. I created the proper crop marks and my design was ready to be printed and cut out.

## Spot Color Clip Art

This assignment is where I began to create artwork which could be placed in InDesign and where I controlled the colors which were specified for printing. Spot colors are colors outside of the CMYK range, and require separate printing plates when printed. For this assignment, I was given a vector clip art image, and had to change its color to only two spot colors. I could use tints of each color to create more depth in my image. For my chick clip art, I chose to use Pantone 226 C and Pantone 3125 C for my spot colors. I thought they were a nice compliment to each other.

I began my process by ungrouping all of the vectors (lines) in the image and replacing its original colors with my two spot colors. I had fun deciding where to place each color and what tints to use where. After completing my chick, and double checking that I eliminated all other colors except my two spot colors, I began to add the text around the image. I inserted the place-holder text, and changed that color to one of my pantone colors (3125 C). I had the text wrap around my chick clip art to enhance the look of my page.

When I thought I was done, my professor walked by and I had her look at my project. She complimented me, but wanted me to go further with my design and experiment a little bit. So, she helped me design my second chick. This image had no background like the original and the chick's coloring was slightly different. The wing and feet were rotated upward to look like it was flying and lines were added behind the image using the pencil tool. The entire image was flipped so that it mirrored the original and the chick was also rotated downwards slightly.

It was fun to be able to experiment with the spot colors and all the tools that can change the look of a clip art image. I enjoyed this project.

## **Postcard # 2**

This postcard project was our applied mid term. It was very similar to our previous postcard assignment in that we could only have two spot colors, and had to add clip art graphics. This project also had to follow the same postal guidelines as the first postcard assignment. The difference, however, was that we all had to create a postcard for the same business. It was a travel agency and we were given the text we had to use and a number of clip art images were provided as well.

I began my midterm assignment by choosing my two spot colors that I wished to use. Because the postcard was based on going to mars with this travel agency, I chose a blue and red color. Blue to represent earth, and red to represent mars. I thought they were suitable colors for the design.

After choosing my color scheme, I looked online for my images. I thought it would be cute to have a planet earth and planet mars on my postcard. I found a clip art image of earth, and changed the coloring to my blue spot color, using the tints as well. Next I tried to find a clip art image of mars, but could not find the right one so I decided to create my own. I added multiple layers of red circles, in different tints of my red color, to create a 3-D looking mars image. I was satisfied enough with my graphics because I didn't have much time to keep looking for more. We had to finish this project in the two hours of class time.

I decided to add a half blue and half red background and I arranged my earth image on the red background and my mars image on the blue background. On the back I also did the same sort of design.

I next had to decide on my font to use. I chose a simple font because I had a simple design and no fancy writing was needed. I added my postal indicia on the back and I was done.

It could have any theme to it: birthday card, party invitation, Christmas card, etc. I decided to go with a Christmas theme because it is the holiday season. I went online in hopes to find a photo for the front of my card. I immediately found one make my design in an upright text box, and that I really liked. It was Santa Clause at the beach with a drink in his hand. I knew I was going to build my theme off of that picture.

I needed to add text to my card, so I came up with a silly saying for the front and inside. The font I used was Tekton Pro Bold, in different font sizes. For the inside, I went with Pantone 485 C and Pantone Warm Gray 5 C for my two spot colors. I thought they went

For my images inside the card, I had I did that transformation in Photoshop and placed them into my InDesign Document. That was done using my two pantone spot colors as well.

For the back of my card, I had to then rotate it 180 degrees to get the text and image upside down. I needed to do that because that is the way it would need to be aligned once folded into the card.

I felt a little rushed on this project and I am not 100% in love with my design, but it is, overall, a satisfactory project.

## Bookmark

For this project, we were required to create a bookmark for a book of our choice. We had to include the authors name, the title of the book, and a short synopsis of the book. One side of our project had to me in full color plus one pantone process color, and the other side we could only use one process solid color.

I decided to do my bookmark on the novel *The Wizard of Oz*, by L. Frank Baum. For my front design, I decided to use the full color plus one pantone process color. After finding images of all the characters from *The Wizard of Oz* online, I cropped each image out separately using Photoshop. I then placed each image into my InDesign document and onto the front of my bookmark.

I then had to decided what font type to use for my text. I experimented with a few until I found one that reminded me of the actual book title. After adding my text, I decided that I wanted to rotate it slightly to be on a diagonal to help enhance my design. Because I had to add the pantone process color to the front design, I ended up doing an all over background of Pantone 7412 C behind my images and text. It was a nice subtle, rustic looking color, that is why I chose it.

For the backside of my bookmark, I could only use one pantone solid color, so that limited my design abilities. I was really stumped on what to do on the backside of my project., I think that my final design is very bland and boring because I couldn't think of an interesting way to use my color. I ended up just picking a pantone color very similar to the one on the front and re-wrote the title and added the synopsis. I did add a border around the sides to create some design element, but I am not too happy with the overall look of the backside.
