Cyberpunk defined

- CyberPunk is a dystopian genre based in science fiction. It features hyper futuristic environments with a theme of societal collapse or decay.









Cyberpunk was popularized in the 1980's with the revolution of the science fiction movement. Early cyberpunk titles include Blade runner(1982), Akira, The Cyberpunk games, The Matrix and Shadowrun(1989).



- The word "cyber" relates to the culture of computers, information technology and virtual reality.





- The word "punk" refers to the punk subculture which has anti- establishment views and is based in ideas of individual freedom.

the PUNK movement

- The punk movement became widespread in the 1980's especially in Europe. Punk's exist as a movement against the system. A big part of punk culture is their rebellion and anarchy.
- Fashion, music and photography are especially big parts of punk culture. Bands like My Chemical romance, Sex Pistols and the Misfits are all big parts of the punk scene.







Cyberpunk in Japan

A big part of the Cyberpunk genre exists within Japan; largely within manga, anime and underground films like Akria, Tetsuo: The Iron Man and Ghost in the shell, and Coyboy Bebop. But unlike Western Cyberpunk culture, Japanese cyberpunk is rooted more in themes of dehumanization, repression and post-apocalyptic settings.




Hamlet on the Holodeck(1997)

Blade Runner(1982)
